Executive summary

Title of policy / decision: Poppins Early Years Bursary

Policy / decision type: Cabinet Member Action (CMA)

Overview of policy / decision: Request to draw down up to £1.2m in funding from the Everyone's Essex Reserve over 3 years, to create the Poppins Early Years Bursary. This will support the early years sector to ensure a continuing supply of appropriately qualified early years staff, ensuring that all pre-school aged children have access to high quality childcare provision.

What outcome(s) are you hoping to achieve?: Attracting new qualified early years practitioners to roles within the sector.

Retaining existing qualified and experienced staff

Encourage experienced early years practitioners, who have exited the sector, to return

Provide training, support, and incentives to make the early years workforce feel valued and improve the quality of services provided

Enable childcare providers to offer childcare places at an affordable rate for parents and carers Support the implementation of the new Childcare Reforms, due to be introduced from April 2024 onwards, to enable parents to access a funded place for younger children than currently in place

Rationale for assessment, including data used to assess the impact: By implementing the project we will be able to support the Early Years sector to address challenges around workforce recruitment and retention, while crucially providing residents from disadvantaged communities and backgrounds (including those from levelling up priority cohorts and areas) with opportunities to access good jobs. The Poppins Early Years Bursary links directly into and supports the Essex County Council Early Years teams and their workforce development strategy. There has been a reduction in specialist provision nationally resulting with a workforce who are not sufficiently trained to effectively support grater inclusion in settings and any increase in the diversity of children's needs. By implementing the SEND Specialist Development Pathway, which will target current employees who wish to specialise in working with children with SEND it will reflect on the local level with more support, awareness and potential early identification of developmental issues.

Implementing the Poppins Early Years Bursary will deliver against the following priority areas for the Early Years sector in Essex: -

Attract new early years practitioners to the sector.

Retain existing qualified and experienced staff.

Increase the number of qualified staff within the sector.

Increase participation in early years apprenticeship provision.

Encourage experienced early years practitioners, who have exited the sector, to return.

Additional focus will given to breaking the gender stereotypes within the sector to attract more males into the workforce for example

What actions have already been taken to mitigate any negative impacts?: N/A

How could you strengthen any positive impact(s)?: Engagement and Recruitment events will be delivered across the county and in areas of most need (both from a sufficiency and levelling up angle). This would require investment in branded marketing materials and campaigns to promote. Other areas of good practice derived from both Nightingale and other projects will be added and include reverse job fairs, Essex Opportunities Portal live events and a school and college engagement programme to enable young people aged 14-18 to understand

the opportunities that exist within the sector. The project lead will work in partnership with the ECC Early Years recruitment teams.

Rationale for assessment, including data used to assess the impact: This decision seeks funding to support people from priority cohorts, priority areas or low-income households to access training and qualifications to enable them to join the Early Years sector.

It proposes implementing the Poppins Early Years bursary for a three-year period starting from September 2023. The scheme will have a delivery focus in the priority geographical areas cited within the Council's Levelling-Up White Paper and will additionally support three of the priority cohorts: Children and Adults with SEND or Mental Health conditions, Working Families, and Young Adults not in Education, Employment or Training (NEET). Additionally, this decision will support the pending government reforms within early years and raise the profile of the sector through dedicated recruitment campaigns.

How could you strengthen any positive impact(s)?: Working Families will benefit from childcare provision which will enable parents and carers to return to work and therefore increase their household incomes.

New opportunities for individuals who are NEET will be available so that these young people can join the workforce and earn an income. This can also include individuals with SEND. Through inclusive apprenticeships and training opportunities we can support individuals to access meaningful and paid employment.

Opportunities to upskill within the early years sector will enable employees to increase their earnings and progress into higher paid jobs.

Rationale for assessment, including data used to assess the impact: Nationally the total number of childcare providers fell by 3% between 2021 and 2022, with a 9% fall in the number of childminders in the same period. This is reflective within Essex.

The decline means there aren't enough staff to provide sufficient early years places to meet demand and enable parents and carers return to work. The Poppins Bursary will have a positive impact on families in various different ways. By improving the knowledge and skills of parents in what to look for in their own children, could benefit in the future by recognising any signs of difficulties. By upskilling members of the family, the probability of earning a higher wage increases, which benefits the household.

What actions have already been taken to mitigate any negative impacts?: N/A

How could you strengthen any positive impact(s)?: It costs a new childminder approx. £1,000 to become a registered childminder. There is a grant available to childminders of £600 when they register on their own or £1200 if they register as part of a Childminding Agency. The set up includes the Level 3 Award in preparing to work in homebased childcare, the paediatric first aid certificate and a DBS check. Poppins will cover the set-up costs for new childminders through an interest free loan of up to £1,000. This will enable new childminders to complete their training and registrations, purchase equipment and be ready to receive children. The loan would be paid back over a period between 3 and 12 months.

Anyone applying for funding through the Poppins Bursary will be required to undergo an application process to determine their eligibility to receive monies. This will be carried out by ACL in line with ESFA guidelines and will include employment status and both household and personal incomes. This will ensure that only those who are not able to afford their training are able to receive funding from Poppins.

Support Bursary provides funding for laptop loans. £30,000 has been made available. The bursary will enable us to support families who normally wouldn't be able to self fund this programme.
