2 Minutes

3 Terms of Reference and Procedure Rules

The Panel agreed and noted the Terms of Reference and Procedure Rules

4 Declarations of Interest

Councillor Holland declared an interest as a member of the Essex Fire Authority and as a Member of the LGA Fire Commission. She also advised that her son is a Police Officer for Essex Police.

Councillor Smith declared an interest as a member of the Essex Fire Authority and stated that he has also been invited to attend a meeting of the LGA as an independent party representative.

Councillor Channer declared that she is deputy Cabinet Member to Councillor Madden who has portfolio responsibilities for children and families.

5 Questions to the Chairman from Members of the Public

Councillor Mike Mackrory asked for details of the overall strategy for dealing with knife crime in the County.

The Commissioner acknowledged that serious violent crime is an issue of concern in Essex and that it forms one of the priority areas within the Police and Crime Plan 2016 - 20. One example of how it is being tackled is through knife amnesties, which have been introduced across Essex, with knife surrender bins placed in various locations around the County. He added there had been some success in connection therewith and that work is being done with local organisations to promote awareness to young people of the dangers of knives.

9 Police and Fire Collaboration - Local Business Case update

The Panel considered report EPCP/08/17 by the Chief Executive of the OPCC to the Panel, which provided an update on progress made in relation to the local business case for joint governance of Police and Fire & Rescue Services in Essex.

The following points were made during the ensuing discussion:

- The Commissioner advised that the consultation period concluded on 10th May with formal support being received from the three tier 1 authorities in the County
- Essex is the first county in the country to consult on a local business case for joint governance of police and fire and submit it to the Home Secretary for approval.
- The final version of the local business plan was been submitted to the Home Office on the 19th May. The PCC continues to aim for a 1st Oct start date but he proposed time scale may be affected by the General election.
- The Fire Authority supported the proposal to go out to consultation on the local business case (vote of 15-2)
- Details of the Fire Brigade union's response to the consultation can be found on the PCC website

DECISION

The Panel:

- 1. **Noted** the results of the PCC's public consultation in relation to joint governance of Police and Fire & Rescue Services in Essex;
- 2. **Noted** the final version of Local Business Case for Joint Governance of Police and Fire & Rescue in Essex which was submitted to the Home Office on the 17th May 2017; and
- 3. **Noted** the proposed transition activities which will need to be undertaken prior to the 1st October 2017.

11 Domestic Abuse update

The Panel considered report EPCP/10/17 by Gregg Myddelton (OPCC) and Supt. Tom Simons (Essex Police), providing an update on key developments relating to priority 3 in the Police and Crime Plan:Breaking the cycle of Domestic Abuse.

The following points were raised during the ensuing discussion:

- There has been positive engagement with Health and through this victims have now been identified from hospital A&E and maternity units and referred into help.
- In the past few years there has been a significant increase in reports of abuse from older members of the population
- There is positive engagement with schools in the County although this needs to be developed further.
- In response to a request regarding details of "non violent" abuse, the deputy Commissioner confirmed that relevant data will be provided to the Panel at a later date.
- In response to a request for information regarding repeat offenders, the Panel were advised that whilst this data was not available at the present time, but would be provided at a later date.
- Anna Hook informed the Panel that a Community leaders group panel session (post Manchester bombings) had been held on 31st May. There were representatives from a variety of faith based organisations and it had been a very positive event.

Police and Crime Plan: Update on the proposed joint governance of Police and Fire & Rescue Services in Essex

1. PURPOSE OF THE REPORT

This paper provides an update to the Police and Crime Panel on the progress which has been made to prepare for the implementation of the proposed joint governance of Police and Fire & Rescue Services in Essex.

2. RECOMMENDATIONS

Members are asked to:

- 1. Note the key transition activities which are planned to be undertaken to ensure a smooth transition to the new governance model. The new governance model is subject to the Home Secretary's approval of the Local Business Case.
- 2. Note the progress in delivering the transition activities.

3. LOCAL BUSINESS CASE APPROVAL

The Local Business Case was submitted to the Home Secretary on the 19th May 2017. The final documentation is available to Members on the PCC's website:

http://www.essex.pcc.police.uk/localcaseforchange

The PCC met with the new Minister for Police and Fire, Nick Hurd, on the 6th July. They had a positive meeting. We expect to have a decision on the local business case very soon.

The PCC will advise the Police and Crime Panel of the Home Secretary's decision at the earliest opportunity, once he has received confirmation.

4. TRANSITION ACTIVITY

In advance of a decision by the Home Office, the Office for the PCC has commenced initial work in planning for the transition. This work reports into the Emergency Services Strategic Governance Board which is chaired by the PCC and includes the Chair of the Fire Authority, the Acting Chief Fire Officer and the Chief Constable. The transition planning is being undertaken in close discussion and liaison with senior officers from ECFRS and Essex Police. A Transition Working Group has been established to take this work forward.

The aim of the transition programme (assuming the Home Office approve the decision) is to ensure a smooth as possible transfer to the PCC-style FRA. A detailed project plan has been developed, setting out what will need to be undertaken to enable these priorities to be achieved.

Key activities identified in the project plan include:

- Constitution Develop a revised EFA constitution to reflect the new legislation and statutory order.
- Governance Structure Review existing board structure and identify the appropriate structure to support the PCC-style FRA in their role of effectively governing ECFRS. This will need to be fed into the new constitution.
- Statutory Roles Develop the role of the Statutory Chief Officers under a revised governance model. This will need to be fed into the new constitution.
- Scheme of Delegation Develop a new PCC-style FRA Scheme of Delegation to the senior officers of the ECFRS.
- Governance Meetings Review the existing planned business of the FRA, and realign work to the new governance structure including setting a series of meeting dates for the new boards which will support the PCC-style FRA.
- Formation of Police, Fire and Crime Panel Liaison with Essex County Council's Secretariat team regarding the development of the revised Terms of Reference for the new Police, Fire and Crime Panel.
- Staff Formal Consultation Undertake a formal consultation of all staff on their transfer to the PCC-style FRA.
- Communication Plan Develop an internal communication plan for activity supporting the roll out of the new governance model.

The transition plan and the progress against are reported monthly to the Emergency Services Strategic Governance Board.

5. TRANSITION PROGRESS

A summary of the progress which has been made against the key deliverables is included in **Appendix A**.

6. RISK MANAGEMENT IMPLICATIONS

A risk register is review at each Strategic Governance Board.

7. FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

The costs for the preparation of the Local Business Case and any preparation for transition have been met by the Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner.

1. Purpose of report

This report provides the panel with an update on the work of Essex Police, the OPCC and partners in tackling gangs in Essex.

2. Recommendation

That panel members note the report.

3. Overview

Tackling gangs and organised crime, and reversing the trend in serious violence, which is often the result of gang activity, are two of the key priorities within the Police and Crime Plan for Essex.

Whilst the actual number of gang-related incidents can be difficult to measure, we know that over recent years there has been an increase in the level of serious violence which has been linked to the activity of gangs across parts of Essex.

Tackling this issue requires operational and strategic responses across a wide range of partners.

4. Operation RAPTOR:

Operation Raptor is the operational approach taken by Essex Police to dealing with the issues of Urban Street Gangs (USG) within Essex.

Tackling gang criminality & knife crime also form a key part of the draft Essex Police Crime Prevention Strategy.

The strategic aims of Operation Raptor are:

- Support victims of gang crime in particular repeat victims and those vulnerable to gang exploitation & violence
- Target the offenders, in particular repeat offenders and, in doing so, increase the number of positive outcomes (prosecution or other intervention)
- Work with local communities, the media, businesses and partners to increase the level of actionable intelligence
- Work with other forces and partners to understand and tackle to local drugs supply market – "County Lines"
- Identify & address patterns, trends & hot spots in knife crime
- Work with schools, colleges & the voluntary sector to effectively engage with young people about the dangers of gangs and the carrying of knives, supporting diversionary activity

Whilst very important, enforcement activity is only a part of the overall approach to tackle USG's. To be effective, it must form part of co-ordinated approach across Essex Police and its partners. To this end, Safer Essex has established a sub-group to co-ordinate learning and activity across the partnership in order to tackle the issue of gangs across the partnership.

5. Current USG picture:

The Essex Individual Harm Matrix has been developed to identify the most harmful gang / drug line member's active in Essex.

This comprises a combination of Trident recognised gang members operating in Essex, London based drug dealers / members who travel to Essex to commit offences and local nominals linked to specific gangs /drug lines that are active in Essex.

The individuals are scored based on violent offences and intelligence relating to violence AND drug offences and intelligence relating to drug dealing.

There are currently 150 active individuals representing 48 different Gangs on the Matrix. The age range of the gang members is 13 -56 with an average of 24.

The matrix also holds records for 91 individuals who were active but currently in custody and for 124 inactive individuals where no intelligence has been received for at least 3 months.

6. Raptor Enforcement Teams

All three Local Policing Areas (LPAs) continue to have dedicated Operation Raptor enforcement teams. The focus of these teams is to carry out enforcement activity focused towards disrupting gang activity. The teams can come together if required in response to a specific issue, or work as individual teams on their respective LPAs. They are supported as required by specialist teams.

Essex Police is currently reviewing further proactive support options to support Op RAPTOR and other key operational areas. Technological advances have also offered new proactive opportunities, which Essex police will utilise in its approach to USG.

Since January 2017, RAPTOR teams across the County have;

- Arrested 279 people
- Charged 130 people
- Submitted 484 Intelligence reports
- Seized approximately £100,000.00 in cash.
- Seized 31 Vehicles

7. Cross Border Working

One of the key issues in tackling 'County Lines' is that the networks involved are not based solely within the Essex Police Districts. Within Essex, it is often the "lower levels" of the network that are visible, making effective enforcement challenging, as these subjects are easily replaced by the wider network.

Over the last 12 months, Essex Police have been working with the Metropolitan Police Service (MPS) to take a more holistic approach to the entire county line, through an approach called Project DENVER. Project DENVER has seen joint activity between Essex Police & MPS, on what was assessed as one of the most significant gangs within the MPS (with significant levels of violence associated with their activity). Over the last year, co-ordinated activity has and continues to be undertaken – which has had a significant reduction in the activity of this specific line.

The approach taken in Project DENVER is now being expanded to further "lines" operating within the MPS & Essex Police. This approach is recognised as good practice by national government and is being established in other areas.

8. Community Policing Hubs

Partnership working & the sharing of information & intelligence is key to effectively tackling gangs.

As local Community Safety Hubs continue to develop across the districts and unitaries, RAPTOR teams continue to form an integral part of those multi-organisational information sharing arrangements.

Local RAPTOR tasking has been established in a number of areas linked to the hubs. This involves a range if partner agencies coming together to share information & intelligence & co-ordinate a multi-agency approach. This approach will continue to be developed over the forthcoming year

9. Media

Over the past 12-months Op Raptor has become firmly established in the consciousness of the public and local and national media. Communications activity over the last year has been extremely proactive with on average between two and four press releases issued every week showcasing everything from arrests, operations, warrants and sentencings to activity with stakeholders (for example community events, conferences with partners and closure orders). During the Raptor weeks of action activity is heightened further with one media release per day for the duration.

The Raptor teams are featured heavily in local media and have now attracted national media interest. Negotiations remain ongoing between the Essex Police

press office and the BBC who are hoping to feature the Op Raptor teams in two major programmes (Ill Gotten Gains and Panorama).

10. Institute of Community Safety (ICS) & Safer Essex

The Institute for Community Safety (ICS), working closely with the Home Office, were recently commissioned by the PCC to develop a countywide strategic framework for tackling gangs, violence & vulnerability.

The ICS report identified five key themes;

- 1) Data/intelligence understanding the nature of the threat posed by gangs around violence and vulnerability is the key to partnerships being in a position to effectively tackle the problem. Such understanding is crucial to drawing in partners who may not initially see the issue as something they should be involved with, but who are undoubtedly impacted by this agenda.
- 2) Governance this covers all aspects of the work, and is about leadership, vision, partnerships, performance management and target monitoring. Leadership matters as much at a tactical level as it does at a strategic level, but the key is how leaders persuade other partners why they should be involved, and how. The problem of gangs, violence and vulnerability is cross-cutting, which means leadership and governance in a county and regional context is a key factor for success in this arena.
- 3) Enforcement/cross-border working an inconsistent use of tools and powers by partnerships to tackle gangs has been a feature of most gang-affected areas over the past five years. With a national increase in county lines activity, regions and partnerships previously unaffected by gangs have found themselves having to review procedures and activities. The phenomenon of county lines has led to the need for tools and powers that reflect the rise in exploitation and close links to trafficking and modern slavery. In addition, there is a crucial need for regions to link both strategically and operationally with those large urban areas exporting the gang issue.
- 4) Prevention preventing young people from becoming involved with gangs, violence and vulnerability is crucial if the cycle of gang violence is to be broken. Given the wide and almost endless scope of prevention work, we decided, after initial discussions with senior managers to

concentrate on schools, Pupil Referral Units (PRUs), alternative provision and vulnerable locations.

5) Safeguarding – primarily, this issue is about safeguarding and protecting vulnerable people, who are being exploited by gangs. We know that harm is often hidden. With many vulnerable people it is not until the full circumstances surrounding that person are understood that the potential for harm is identified.

Safer Essex has been identified as the most appropriate partnership body through which this issue should be owned and developed. A sub-group of Safer Essex has been established to take forward this work, with a Tackling Gangs symposium taking place in mid- July to develop a joint action plan.

11. Diversionary Activity

In December 2016 the PCC commissioned a new service to pilot and deliver targeted interventions that seek to protect young people from the harm associated with gang affiliation. The project was a direct response to the commitment within the Police and Crime Plan to "prevent the exploitation of children and vulnerable people by gangs through early intervention initiatives and jointly commissioning diversionary activities". The project was split into two requirements;

- 1. To provide direct, targeted support to individuals at highest risk of exploitation to divert them away from engaging in gang activity, and
- 2. Educating and informing professionals about identifying risk factors of gang-involvement, and how to signpost young people into appropriate support.

Following a competitive tender process the contract was awarded to an organisation called "Gangsline" and delivery commenced in January 2017. The pilot is delivered in 6 areas with known 'County Lines' issues; Chelmsford, Colchester, Thurrock, Southend-on-Sea, Tendring and Basildon. The project will deliver one-to-one support with 100 vulnerable young people over 2 years, and provide awareness training to more than 700 professionals. It will be evaluated to inform future roll out.

The PCC also provides funding to a number of organisations including: The Essex Rape Crisis Partnership (ERCP), The Children's Society, Catch22 and Victim Support which provide support to young people that may have been

victims of gang-related crime or may be at risk of exploitation. In addition, the PCC provides funding to a range of activities through the Community Safety Development Fund (CSDF) which offer diversionary activity for young people and raise awareness of the dangers of carrying weapons, especially knives. Specific knife-crime charities have been supported through the PCC's CSDF in recent years.

12. Op SCEPTRE (Knife Crime)

The use of knives as part of the USG culture continues to grow. Op SCEPTRE is the national operation, designed to combat the increase of knife crime in Essex. Essex Police continue to participate in the national "Op SCEPTRE" activity. In 2017, there has been one official "week of action" under Op SCEPTRE (May 1st to 8th). A second week of activity is planned in July 2017.

Essex Police will continue to develop its activity to deal with this issue, both as part of Op RAPTOR and as specific activity under Op SCEPTRE.

13. Summary of key strategic focus for 2017

During 2017, Operation RAPTOR will continue to develop its approach to tackle USG, specifically focusing on;

- Development of partnership approach to USG cognisant that enforcement activity alone will not tackle the issue.
- Development of effective cross border working sharing of information & intelligence to take a holistic approach to USG.
- Development of dealing with vulnerability issues, including the use of legislation not previously associated with USG (such as Human Trafficking / Civil Orders).
- Activity to tackle knife crime.

1 Apologies for Absence and Notices of Substitution

Councillor John Jowers, Essex County Council; Councillor Bob Shepherd, Chelmsford City Council and Kay Odysseos presented their apologies.

2 Election of Chairman

In his absence, Councillor Penny Channer nominated Councillor John Jowers as Chairman of this sub-committee for which he is an ex-officio member. The nomination was seconded by Councillor Godfrey Isaacs.

In Councillor Jowers' absence Councillor Isaacs nominated Councillor Channer as Chairman for this meeting; a nomination Councillor Channer was happy to accept.

3 Confirmation of Membership of the Ethics and Integrity Sub-Committee The Sub-Committee noted the membership as listed on the agenda.

The Terms of Reference, which were presented as an addendum to the meeting, were confirmed and **noted** by the Sub-Committee

4 Police and Crime Commissioner's Ethics and Integrity Framework; and the Essex Police Code of Ethics

Roger Hirst introduced the report to the Sub-Committee and stressed the importance of the Ethics and Integrity framework and the Police Code of Ethics. In addition, Essex Police has recently established an internal Ethics Board; and these initiatives are key in terms of enhancing and improving confidence in policing by the public.

The framework is a publicly available document.

The Essex PCC framework goes beyond the Nolan Principles, for example, with the addition of the concepts of fairness and respect; and it is critical Mr Hirst

stated that the Office for the PCC is held to account on this framework. Mr Hirst also stated he is appreciative of the establishment of the Essex Ethics Board, all of which is driving the current improvement in processes.

Regarding the membership of the Police Ethics Board, it was confirmed that the Independent Advisory Group representative on the Board is a non-police member. It was confirmed that the four independent staff members are appointed on a 12-month basis, and are appointed from staff that are not aligned to any other groups represented on the Board. The OPCC member on the Board will bring matters of interest forward for consideration to this Ethics and Integrity Sub-Committee. There is synergy between the two newly established bodies; and improvement of ethical behaviour of the police force as a whole, and attention being brought to bear at the earliest opportunity of things that should be seen as unacceptable is critical for public trust. Both Councillor's Channer and Isaacs supported this

The Police Standards Department (PSD) presents a quarterly report to the Essex PCC on public complaints and conduct procedures. Previously this was done through self-selection of instances. Now, however, this is done in two parts: self-selection and dip-sampling.

Susannah Hancock informed the Sub-Committee that the national Police code of ethics was established in 2014 - no ethical documentation existed beforehand. One of the key metrics in the Police and Crime Plan is confidence in policing and ethical behaviour is key in that.

Councillor Channer asked whether there is any filtering of issues that go forward to the Police Ethics Board given the size of the organisation? Susannah Hancock responded that the first meeting was held recently and the issues were specifically about ethics and integrity. Police interest groups also feed in any issues they may have collected. Susannah stated she will feed back on the process for sending in issues for consideration. Susannah is the established linkage between the Police Ethics Board and this Sub-Committee.

Action: Susannah Hancock

Councillor Channer questioned whether there is a register of interest for the Police Ethics Board, in particular in relation to the procurement of hospitality and allowances? In response, Susannah Hancock stated there is in terms of secondary employment which has to be declared and decisions are made around any potential conflicts there may be.

A key part of new recruits training is the Police Code of Ethics and what are appropriate and inappropriate behaviours – this includes the use of social media. All police officers and police staff will be held to account on the code of ethics. The PCC agreed to look at continuing professional development on ethics and the frequency of training; and what is in Personal Development Plans about ethics.

Action: Essex Police and Crime Commissioner

5 Future Items for the Sub-Committee

The documentation presented to the meeting explained what is currently in place

to support ethics and integrity; and the standards the Essex PCC is seeking to hold the police to account on, as well as the standards the public can hold him to account on. The Sub-Committee should consider what it might wish to look at moving forward, and how it can assist in moving the ethics agenda forward.

It was **agreed** that the Sub-Committee will not be looking at individual cases but the generality of ethics and integrity. Given the earlier discussions, it was felt that themes such as misconduct could form part of the Forward Plan of the Sub-Committee.

Action: Robert Fox

Susannah Hancock outlined the sorts of ethical dilemmas facing police officers every day, such as the use of force and stop-and-search. In relation to the use of force the recent introduction by the Chief Constable of spit-guards was raised. It was agreed the use of spit-guards could be discussed at the next meeting of this Sub-Committee including an opportunity for members to look at a spit-guard. Key lines of enquiry being the rationale behind the introduction; the impact spitting by those apprehended has on the police force; and the proportionality and force applied in the fitting of them?

Action: Robert Fox / Susannah Hancock

On a wider level Councillor Isaacs questioned how the use of force in Essex compares to that of comparable police forces? It was **agreed** to bring this forward to a future meeting with benchmarking against other police forces on the codes, principles and frequency of force.

Action: Robert Fox / Susannah Hancock

The agenda and minutes of the Performance and Resources Scrutiny Board as well as the Strategic Board will be reviewed to see if there has been anything of relevance to this Sub-Committee to report back on.

Action: Susannah Hancock

Councillor Isaacs asked how harassment and bullying is monitored and acted upon within the force? Mr Hirst responded that he is not involved in any individual cases. However, from June 2018 when new legislation will take effect, he will take over from the Chief Constable the review process when individuals are unhappy with the outcome on cases. Currently appeal cases go to the Chief Constable for review.

It was **agreed** that further suggestions and a call for ideas will be made outside this meeting to those who could not attend.

Action: Robert Fox

With regard to issues of corruption, Mr Hirst explained that an Anti-corruption Unit at Essex Police to track and investigate any suggestion of corruption. The PCC has not seen any evidence of cases of corruption other than those highlighted by the dip-sampling in terms of misconduct. There are no linkages to organised crime and this has been probed; however the OPCC is not complacent about corruption. Essex Police have invested in the latest Anti-corruption software which once installed will help to track websites, emails etc. This is transparent and where it has been installed in other parts of the country,

has led to the managing of behaviours of officers.
