Executive summary

Overview of policy / decision: The current property and facilities management contract is currently in contract (until September 2026) with MITIE and Lambert Smith Hampton. This contract is a total facilities management contract, where all aspects of facilities management and property are delivered across all of Essex. The purpose of the decision is to undertake a full review of the future property and facilities management, drawing down on the transformation reserve to undertake a design and discovery phase for all the services that ECC may require. This will include market analysis, looking at best practice and scoping options for future delivery.

What outcome(s) are you hoping to achieve?: Authority and approval to review the existing contract and explore procurement options for the options that need to be in place from autumn 2026. Securing the necessary resources to complete the exploration and discovery phase and enable options to be presented.
