Executive summary

Title of policy / decision: Integrated Health and Justice Service Contract Extension

Policy / decision type: Cabinet Decision

Overview of policy / **decision:** This is to extend the current Integrated Health and Justice Service for a further two years, as per the contract terms. The service seeks to ensure individuals with a range of vulnerabilities are diverted and supported out of crime by addressing a wide range of health and social care needs.

What outcome(s) are you hoping to achieve?: This service is a key part of ensuring vulnerable offenders are diverted into health and social care support, which in turn will reduce their chances of re-offending. Key "vulnerable" groups for the service include people with mental or physical health problems, people with LD or Autism, young people and people with substance misuse issues. The service also targets women detainees and aims to reduce the number of women given short-term prison sentences. This benefits not just the women concerned (who tend to have worse outcomes in prison) but also the families, by preventing family break-up. Thus the key aims are:

Reduction in Re-offending by vulnerable people

Reduction in the number of women receiving custodial sentences

Increase in the number of community treatment orders made

Additionally, the service has to submit performance data nationally to NHS England. Systems were put in place at the start of the contract to gather such data, and these will continue to be used.

Rationale for assessment, including data used to assess the impact: The service submits detailed performance data to NHS England and local commissioners (the Police Fire and Crime Commissioner, ICPs and regional NHS England commissioners). Regular service user feedback is collected and presented quarterly. Performance data is positive and compares well to regionally and nationally. Service user feedback consistently achieves positive scores. Wider data from the health and justice pathway indicates that if an individual engages with the full support on offer, less than 4% re-present within 12 months.

What actions have already been taken to mitigate any negative impacts: The service will work with any vulnerable offender detained by Essex Police, on trial in Essex courts or pre-arrest for those whose behaviour is causing concern to the public.
