## Section 2: Policy to be analysed

2.1 Is this a new policy (or decision) or a change to an existing policy, practice or project?

This is an extension of the existing temporary change to the standard regime of driven highway safety inspections in order to protect the health and safety of staff of ECC and Ringway Jacobs and to a more limited extent the wider population.

In order to continue to deliver this service whilst following social distancing guidelines, it is proposed that we continue to operate single-crewed inspections for an extended period of time.

Further consideration has also been given to using video technology to supplement the revised single manned inspections process, enabling the identification of all defect priorities. These changes are to come into effect on 1 April 2021, as per **Appendix 2.** 

2.2 Describe the main aims, objectives and purpose of the policy (or decision):

The United Kingdom is having to respond to the coronavirus outbreak.

The Health Protection (Coronavirus, Restrictions) Order 2020 came into force on 26 March 2020 and most organisations have closed workplaces and places where people gather.

> Against this context the Council previously had to consider the regime of highway safety inspections in Essex. The inspection regime is one of the most fundamental duties of the highway authority as it is part of our system to ensure that we have taken reasonable care to ensure that highways are not dangerous.

As a result of the pandemic we put in place a system of single crewed vehicles with one person carrying out both roles, and the inspection scope of driven inspections was reduced to focus on the identification of Priority 1 and 2 defects only.

What outcome(s) are you hoping to achieve (i.e. decommissioning or commissioning a service)?

Although the highway safety inspections regime is not covered by statutory regulations, the service is one where social distancing, in line with Government advice, should be observed in order to reduce the potential impact of Covid19 on the staff delivering the service.

If the recommendations are adopted, inspections will continue to be undertaken where these protocols can be observed.

Implementing these changes, in line with Government advice will be vital to maintaining public health and help reduce the risk of the spread of coronavirus.
