Executive summary

Title of policy / decision: Transforming Youth Service – Colchester Youth Centre refurbishment projects

Policy / **decision type:** Executive Director Decision (EDD)

Overview of policy / decision: Investing in improved accommodation for three youth centres in Colchester. This project will refurbish the Colchester Townhouse, Highwoods and Stanway Youth Centres, developing the Townhouse into a flagship youth centre in the heart of the town centre and a space fit for young people in the area for a long time to come. The refurbishments will provide a comprehensive range of improvements and extensions to current provision to ensure that Colchester's young people have access to high quality facilities and professional support.

Lack of any significant investment over many years has led to a situation where the existing facilities no longer fully meet the needs of service users and consequently are not used to their full capacity.

What outcome(s) are you hoping to achieve?: The investment will support vulnerable children in Essex to fulfil their potential. The refurbished accommodation will provide young people with greater opportunity to access a variety of services and opportunities. Current and future young people attending the facilities will benefit from upgraded accommodation that caters for their needs and enables the youth centre to continue significantly improved employment, education and training opportunities and life chances for young people in Colchester, including those from deprived communities.

The outcome from the refurbishment works at the youth centres will significantly improve employment, education and training opportunities and life chances for young people in Colchester, including those from deprived communities, the benefits will be:

- Increased opportunities for young people to access skilled youth professionals
- Increased skills levels for young people within Colchester and surrounding areas.
- Increased access and opportunities for young people to support their wellbeing.
- Prospect for greater engagement and social mixing of young people within Colchester and surrounding communities
- Increased variety of services and opportunities available to young people
- Increased footfall to the Townhouse (and therefore town centre).
- Improved physical health and wellbeing (e.g., due to bouldering facility and sports hall facilities)

Rationale for assessment, including data used to assess the impact: The outcomes will include significantly improved employment, education and training opportunities and life chances for young people in Colchester, including those from deprived communities, by raising their confidence and aspirations through improved access to state-of-the-art facilities that facilitate targeted service delivery.

Growth of economic opportunity in Colchester could also help address wider deprivation across North Essex. However, the borough needs to minimise its over-reliance on jobs in the predominant four sectors that have been vulnerable to the effects of COVID-19 (i.e., retail, tourism, hospitality, and healthcare). Productivity and earnings remain low (GVA/hour is 87.7% of the East of England's) due to prevalence of low-productivity sectors, part-time work and out-commuting of skilled workers. Local transport challenges, including between the most deprived areas and emerging employment centres, have also been detrimental to the development and retention of young people in local employment. Colchester borough is one of the fastest growing areas in terms of population in the UK with an expected increase of 15.6% across all ages by 2043 (from 2018

The target beneficiaries for this project are young people aged 13-19, and up to age 25 for those with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND). Additionally, the Youth Service recognises that the children of today are the young people of tomorrow and that as the pace of change continues to accelerate, particularly for this generation, we will ensure that the facilities and services provided also cater for children when they reach secondary school age.
