Section 2: Policy to be analysed

2.1 Is this a new policy (or decision) or a change to an existing policy, practice or project?

This EqIA relates to moving Essex residents with complex and challenging behaviour from long stay mental health hospitals to supported living under the Winterbourne Review and Transforming Care Agenda.

It is a one-off procurement to support 10 complex individuals that require specialist accommodation and support to be able to live in the community and meet their outcomes.

2.2 Describe the main aims, objectives and purpose of the policy (or decision):

 The aim of this project is to enable 10 Essex residents with complex and challenging behaviour to leave hospital, where some have been stuck for 20years, and live in the community, meeting their aspirations.

What outcome(s) are you hoping to achieve (ie decommissioning or commissioning a service)?

- Procurement of a care organisation to provide specialist support to the 10 residents
- property management is Included in the contract. This is be provided directly
 by the care organisation or by sub-contracting arrangement. This service will
 ensure maintenance of the property and is dealt with promptly and in
 accordance with the residents needs.
- Provide a specialist care and support to 10 complex people with behaviours that challenge services. These people current reside in secure hospital setting due there being no care and accommodation already in the

	community to support them.
2.3	Does or will the policy or decision affect:
	Yes the decision will affect Service Users. This bespoke scheme will enable 10 people to live independently in the community rather than institutionalised within hospital or residential environments.
	Will the policy or decision influence how organisations operate?
	Organisations that will likely be affected: The care providers that wins the tender.
	A contract will be awarded to a Care provider. Within this contract ECC will agree with the provider that certain standards of care are met and that reviews and problem solving techniques are frequently used to maintain the best outcomes for the individuals to allow them to meet their aspirations to the best of their ability.
	ECC will also hold eviction rights on the property. ECC are committed to provide lifetime homes for people with complex and challenging behaviour.

	There is no change in resource required.

	The procurement to provide care, support and housing management to people whose behaviour is deemed to be challenging, supports several of the High Level Outcomes directly:

	People in Essex can live independently and exercise choice and control over their lives
	 Adults Vision – Helping People to Help Themselves - every person should be able to live independently within their own home and family, without the need for dependency on social care services.
	By providing a supported housing scheme that is built on the principles of the Care Act, Essex County Council will be able to work with the residents, families and advocates to provide them with a service to achieve the outcomes that are important to them.

3.1 What does the information tell you about those groups identified?

Approximately 5% of the population of people with learning disabilities may present with severely challenging behaviours. This is an extremely diverse group including individuals with all levels of cognitive ability from mild to profound learning disability; those with sensory impairments or physical disabilities; those with severe mental illness and those with a history of offending or forensic behaviours.

Historically this group would have been managed by securing an admission to long stay hospital or specialist residential care. With the increased emphasis on community integration and the intention of hospital services to provide brief, focused interventions for circumscribed mental health needs, the responsibility falls increasingly to mainstream learning disability services (including day care, residential care, respite and Learning Disability Teams) to work with clients who exhibit behaviours that challenge. Given the diversity and complexity of the service users who present with such behaviour, it is essential that those professionals who provide services are both appropriately skilled and sufficiently resourced to provide a quality service.

Have you consulted or involved those groups that are likely to be affected by the policy or decision you want to implement? If so, what were their views and how have their views influenced your decision?

Social workers within the Complex Behaviour Team have engaged with the clients who will be allocated to this scheme, along with their families, advocates and current nursing support staff. These people are all happy to be leaving their current situation and ready to live as independently as possible in the community.

Additional vacancies will be available, that will be filled as and when the property is right for any individual.

Engagement with the people who will reside in this housing scheme is ongoing. Many will need long transition periods to enable them to settle into their new home. Their Social worker, current support team and the new support team will spend time with the individuals and their families to ensure their new home is what they would like and will enable them to meet their outcomes.
