2.1	Is this a new policy (or decision) or a change to an existing policy, practice or project? New decision.
2.2	Describe the main aims, objectives and purpose of the policy (or decision): ECC's strategic approach is to support children to remain within their families where possible. Where children cannot safely remain with their families, we seek to provide high quality substitute care, preferably within family settings such as foster care.
	If no suitable placements are available we seek suitably matched high-quality residential units, as near as possible to the child's home locality to maintain links with their families and communities.
	To meet the authority's statutory responsibilities under the Children Act 1989, the Children and Families Act 2014 and the Children and Social Work Act 2017 when providing individual packages of care for residential placements.
	What outcome(s) are you hoping to achieve (ie decommissioning or commissioning a service)?
	Establishing a multi-provider framework agreement to facilitate the purchase of individual residential care placements. To ensure legal compliance, providing a framework for improving quality assurance, performance management, safeguards for children and young people with improved financial transparency. Current placements are made on a spot purchase basis.
2.3	Does or will the policy or decision affect: service users employees

the wider community or groups of people, particularly where there are areas of known inequalities? The framework will provide the placement team with a compliant mechanism to purchase residential placements with. All providers on the framework will undergo a procurement procedure to ensure quality and price and a mini competition will be used to ensure individual placements meet an approved matching questionnaire. The framework will provide the team with clearer performance management mechanism this will mean that the placement team can manage and issues with a placement more effectively. The service users will benefit from the framework as it ensures the authority is putting in place a mechanism to manage demand with pre-approved quality assured providers with key performance indicators detailed within the service specification. Will the policy or decision influence how organisations operate? The formation of a framework will provide a structured layer of pre-agreed terms and conditions, expectations, outcomes and price structure outside of an emergency/crisis negotiated placement. It will provide the operational team the commercial support and reassurance of robust contractual agreements, stakeholder engagement and market management. All placements will be made via a mini competition where a matching questionnaire will be used to ensure individual children's needs are met. 2.4 Will the policy or decision involve substantial changes in resources? 3.1 What does the information tell you about those groups identified?

The demand for residential placements has remained steady and as of June 2018 there were 115 children in such a placement. However, there has been an increase in demand for placements that can support young people with more complex needs and vulnerabilities, including those at risk of gang involvement, substance misuse and Child Sexual Exploitation (CSE). Where appropriate for the child ECC would aim to make placements within its boundaries or closer to home to ensure families and social networks are maintained. Early market engagement with Providers has seen a willingness for some providers to develop units in EEC. With other neighbouring authorities vying for and making placements in ECC it is important that ECC engages and build relationships with providers.

Some placements are made in an emergency/crisis situation. Therefore it is paramount that ECC carries out as much pre-planning and quality assurance measures with the providers before a crisis referral is made.

Have you consulted or involved those groups that are likely to be affected by the policy or decision you want to implement? If so, what were their views and how have their views influenced your decision?

The involvement team have surveyed service users and obtained feedback on what factors are important to them when considering a placement. The feedback has shown that the proximity of the placement to school, friends and family is the most important. This has been reflected in the service specification of the framework and the matching questionnaire.

ECC has held 2 market engagement events during February and June 2018 these early discussions with providers has help shaped influenced the preferred recommendation in the CMA options. A further 2 more events are scheduled for January and March 2019.

There have been several internal stakeholder meetings to identify the operational needs and how commissioning and contracts teams can assist them to best meet their business objectives. Officers are mindful of the financial pressures on the Council and expect the evaluation of this revised proves to provide greater clarity in relation to provider pricing structures and cost.
