Overview of policy / decision: Adoption of our new Corporate Parenting Strategy. This sets out our strategic approach to how we carry out our statutory responsibilities as corporate parents to children in care and care leavers.

- 4. Children and young people in care and leaving care are happy, healthy and safe
- 5. Children and young people in care and leaving care are proud to be who they are and feel a sense of belonging
- 6. Children and young people in care and leaving care feel happy, confident and secure in school, college, university or training, have improved educational outcomes and high aspirations for the future
- 7. Care leavers feel cared for, settled, connected to others and supported to find jobs and start adult life

Rationale for assessment, including data used to assess the impact: The priorities in the strategy aim to help children in care and care leavers to be supported to be proud to be themselves, feel a sense of belonging, have good emotional wellbeing and have high aspirations. It pays particular attention to protected groups including young mothers, BAME children and young people and Separated Migrant Children and Young People. While children and young people in care and care leavers represent a very small part of the population, the impacts on them as individuals would be significant. We have consulted with care leavers and professionals to ensure that we have a positive impact on vulnerable children and young people and consider lesser heard voices, such as children with disabilities.

What actions have already been taken to mitigate any negative impacts: There are no identified negative impacts, but we will continue to work with key groups such as the "Proud to be Me" (BAME) working group and care leavers who have their own children to recognise and address any inequalities that arise, as well as through audits and surveys.

Rationale for assessment, including data used to assess the impact: The strategy sets out a clear direction to improve outcomes for our most vulnerable children - those in and leaving care, particularly around supporting the transition to adulthood (care leavers), supporting good emotional wellbeing (all ages) and supporting those who have experienced trauma succeed in education and employment. The number of children and young people impacted is small relative to the population, but the potential impact on them as individuals is significant. The strategy is for all-Essex - the next stage (Delivery Plans) will focus on localities.
