What is autism?

Autism short for Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD), a lifelong disability which affects how people communicate and interact with the world.

Autism is a spectrum condition, ranging from individuals in need of 24-hour care, to people who struggle with some aspects of everyday life including forming friendships, coping at school or managing work.

Every person with autism is different. Some people may share some of the following characteristics:

- communication issues;
- repetitive behaviour and routines and difficulty with unexpected change;
- anxiety in social situations and difficulty with interacting;
- sensory sensitivity to light, touch, sound or smell;
- intense and highly focused interests.

5 year All Age Autism Strategy launched in April 2020

We want Essex to be recognised as an autism friendly county in which people with autism can live fulfilling and meaningful lives within communities that are understanding and supportive.



We have developed a strategy for the next five years with people with autism, family members, health, voluntary and community partners and other key stakeholders.



The strategy takes a whole life approach and encompasses children, young people, adults and older adults with autism and considers the views, wishes and opinions of carers and families.



It has been informed by people with lived experience and their families and carers, including consultation and engagement within our network and partnerships.

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All Age Autism Joint ECC and Health Commissioners Forum established

- To support delivery on Diagnosis, Assessment and Support
- ECC commissioners and CCG commissioners from each area are invited including Southend and Thurrock
- 12-month countywide BCF funded autism navigator/support service pilot commenced in April 2020 and delivered by Summit Services (not including Southend and Thurrock) to support adults seeking a diagnosis, to support them with information support whilst they are awaiting their assessment, to known what to expect, and support post diagnosis.
 Pilot ends March 2021
- Procurement underway for longer term Joint service arrangement for April 2021 onwards
 Countywide service arrangement is dependent on future funding

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- Further work to be undertaken to align with the Children's Diagnosis pathway.

Covid-19 Autism Survey undertaken via the Essex All Age Autism Partnership

81% of respondents were parents

19% responded that their mental health was much worse.

31% responded that their mental health was somewhat worse.

88% responded that the reason was disruption of routine. The next highest reasons given were:

- Anxiety of the unknown;
- Social isolation;
- Difficulty sleeping.

When asked about positives, the majority discussed school:

- "Not having to go to school and be faced with lack of support and understanding"
- "No school!"
- "Not worried about going to school"

Support available during pandemic for people with autism and their families

The Essex Wellbeing Service continues to provide support to Essex residents including:

- Managing and coping with change
- Managing anxiety and staying active
- Maintaining healthy relationships and accessing peer support
- Using technology
- Understanding coronavirus
- Coping with separation and loss
- Practical support including help to get food and medication

Learning Disabilities & Autism service providers including Summit Services are working within the Essex Wellbeing Service, to provide specialist practical and emotional support to individuals with Learning Disabilities and/or Autism during the pandemic and their carers.

- Stay Connected Sport for Confidence are providing Occupational Therapy intervention to vulnerable adults, primarily those with Learning Disabilities and/or Autism, at risk of social isolation due to Covid-19 restrictions / reduced access to ordinary services
- Digital outreach Day Opportunities providers are providing digital outreach via use of technology including wellbeing telephone calls and Zoom sessions for cooking, dance, craft and other peer activities
- Essex Carers Network are working to connect families/parents caring for people with learning disabilities and/or autism, to share experiences, information and for peer support
- Mental Health services including Futures in Mind are analysing weekly wellbeing calls and services including ACL Mental Health Wellbeing & Recovery Programme, The Family Innovation Funded services and Triple P parenting programme for clients known to them including people with autism are continuing.

SEND and Autism Services



Education Health & Care Plans and Autism - as of December 2020

- Essex County Council currently has 10,108 Education, Health and Care Plans (EHCPs);
- 3,613 EHCPs primary need is listed as Autistic Spectrum Disorder (ASD), which is 35% of the EHCP population (this is a 67% increase from 2015);
- Autism Spectrum Disorder is the highest proportion of our EHCP population with Social, Emotional Mental Health (SEMH) needs having the second highest proportion (16%);
- ECC currently has 22,518 pupils on SEN Support; 2004 (8.9%) of these children and young people (CYP) have their primary need identified as autism. This is an increase from 2015, where ECC had 684 CYP identified with autism on SEN Support (3%).

- Developing the support available for mainstream schools in supporting young people with autism.

The Chatten School

- 75 place school in Witham for children and young people with severe autism;
- Opening September 2021.

Autism Support Centre Review

The purpose of the review is to:

- Gather evidence and a thorough understanding of what works well and less well currently, for who, where and why;
- Determine the future vision and ambitions for the enhanced provisions in order to build our requirements for future commissioning and delivery;
- Develop options to meet our future ambitions.
- Ensure Enhanced Provisions are fairly funded.
- The review is being approached in three workstreams:
 - Understanding the current operating model;
 - Determining the commissioning requirements;
 - Exploring the options for future delivery.
