Budget Announcement Updates

Putting people at the heart of everything we do is at the cornerstone of the policies of this Conservative Administration and investing in this County's future while embracing new technologies, will ensure Essex goes from strength to strength.

That is why at the Budget meeting in February I announced vital extra resources to help every resident in Essex and crucially some of the most

vulnerable in our society. Not only is this the pragmatic approach it is also the right thing to do.

Therefore, as I announced earlier there will be an extra:

- £1m to support our strategic ambitions around mental health
- £700k to improve our footpaths and pavements
- £500k to tackle county lines gangs with the PFFC, and
- £250k to combat homelessness

Mental Health -

On Mental Health, the funding I announced will focus on securing improved early intervention responses for vulnerable people in our society, with a specific emphasis on children in care, care leavers and children with a disability such as autism.

We have already embarked upon several projects. These include training specialist mental health coaches for care leavers and homeless young people to help them through difficult times and enable them to become more emotionally stable and resilient, allowing them to develop positive aspiration for the future.

We will also be investing in a study to understand the nature and scale of the mental health challenge amongst former service personnel and their families in the County. This will ensure we can provide the best possible support to the brave men and women of our armed forces that live here in our county.

Footpaths and Pavements -

As announced, this earlier this morning, the additional £700k announced in the budget will be complemented by a £1m grant from the Department for Transport – to create an initiative where each and every county council member will get the opportunity to identify priority footways in their areas for repair. My able colleague Cllr Bentley has written to you all this morning with details of how to ensure you can get work done; putting County Councillors in control in their Divisions.

County Lines -

On tackling the scourge of County Lines gangs, the first Violence and Vulnerability Round Table took place last Friday 10th May. This forum is the first of a series of multi-agency meetings which bring together the police, youth offending services, public health, and local government to

create a partnership approach to dealing with all violent crime in Essex. Our funding will help the partnership approach in several ways, namely:

- To undertake early identification, referral and support of those at risk
- To provide education, myth busting, skills and qualification to vulnerable young people so they are less likely to become involved in gang activity, and
- To undertake disruption activity to create the conditions in which gang activity cannot thrive

I look forward to bringing further updates on the progress of the PFCC and ECC in tackling County Lines.

Homelessness –

I am happy to confirm that since my announcement for £250k extra funding for homelessness and rough sleeping, the Council have been in detailed discussions with providers for 2 key programmes.

The first is a preventative programme aimed at working with vulnerable people and families with the aim of stopping 150 households in Essex from becoming homeless.

The second is a programme working with 50 of the most vulnerable rough sleepers to help to break the cycle of homelessness. Negotiations have gone well, and we will be looking to sign the contracts with these providers over the next few weeks.

Conclusion

So, to sum up. We have an excellent team in Cabinet, and a commitment to tackle the big issues affecting the county – with a programme of work to match – I look forward to continuing to deliver it.
