Executive summary

Title of policy / decision: Annual Review of the Live at Home Framework 2023/24

Policy / decision type: Cabinet Member Action (CMA)

Overview of policy / decision: The current LaH Framework commenced in August 2021 for a four-year term and provides a contractual mechanism to place adults requiring long term domiciliary services with good quality providers that can meet their eligible assessed needs. Typically, around 6,400 Adults receive domiciliary care a week, equating to 118,000 hours. Around 68,000 hours of this are delivered by framework providers.

The Annual Review Process detailed within the Live at Home framework (where providers are required to select rates for new care packages) is due to be undertaken and permission is sought to increase the minimum rate paid for existing longer term domiciliary care packages commissioned through both the framework and on a spot basis to support the financial sustainability of those care providers.

As part of the Annual Review Process, existing framework providers wishing to expand across Essex will have the opportunity to bid to deliver services in new areas. This will aim to support the increase in capacity in districts and wards where there is a heavier reliance on spot purchased provision.

What outcome(s) are you hoping to achieve?: This decision will help support the aim of the Essex Vision for people to enjoy life long into old age by using a tiered approach and offering work to the highest quality domiciliary care providers first who are best placed to reduce and delay the deterioration of Adults' skills, abilities and wellbeing, whilst ensuring the right services are available in the right place and when they are most needed.

It will also help enable the prioritisation of high quality suppliers, giving the ability to strengthen relationships with those domiciliary care providers able to meet the ambitions for high calibre care. This:

- gives the Providers confidence to recruit greater numbers of staff to develop their business.
- helps the Council to develop and embed initiatives that may include Trusted Assessors; increasing access to and the use of technology to support care delivery; accessing community assets and support; embedding a preventative and enabling approach to support Adults to retain skills for longer.
